



Saint Andrew Chorale & Orchestra: Works by Britten and Vaughan Williams

On Sunday, April 7 at 3 pm, the Saint Andrew Chorale and Orchestra, along with 80 singers from our New York City Children’s Chorus, will perform two major works composed in England during the early 20th century. Vaughan Williams considered his *Sancta Civitas* (The Holy City) to be his favorite large choral work, written for double chorus, children’s chorus, soloists and orchestra, based on texts he selected from the book of Revelation. Originally conceived for performance on BBC radio, Benjamin Britten’s *The World of the Spirit* for chorus, soloists, narrators, and orchestra is a piece of similarly large proportions, which was not heard in concert performance until 1998. This concert will be the Saint Andrew Music Society’s most ambitious concert undertaking in our 54 seasons, with 120 singers drawn from our Saint Andrew Chorale & New York City Children’s Chorus, plus the Saint Andrew Orchestra, comprising 40 of NYC’s finest freelance players! Admission is \$30 (\$25 – students/seniors 62+); Children 12 and under are free. Will Call tickets are available in advance online.
