## A Letter from Rev. Beverly A. Bartlett

Dear Friends,

Due to staff vacations, you'll note that this week's Pastoral Staff Letter is for both this week and next week.

I have felt like I have been in a bit of a bubble since arriving at the farm in the mountains of North Georgia almost two weeks ago. I have not left the farm in all that time. Since Georgia is a hot spot for the coronavirus, I am not venturing out among folks other than family. It is a beautiful, tranquil bubble to be in--until I turn on the news, and then I am reminded that the world and all its troubles are still there. You've probably heard the stories of the hundreds of Georgia students, teachers and staff that are now in quarantine after just a couple of days of school starting up. As I engage in conversations about my daughter's school's plans to try and re-open safely and develop their hybrid model of learning, I wonder how teachers who are already stretched thin are going to manage teaching both in the classroom and online. There is a lot of hard work going on--even in the bubble of what is usually August vacation time.

I realize that my bubble here at the farm is a privilege. Last night I watched the story on the PBS News Hour of desperate people hiking through the rainforests where South America meets Central America, some of them injured, most of them with little to no food, some of them having had everything but the clothes on their backs stolen at gunpoint, some carrying children, helping pregnant women, and passing by the remains of those who didn't make it. They are fleeing violence and oppression in their own countries, or poverty so extreme there is no way to support themselves or their families. No one makes a trip like that for anything short of a desperate attempt at survival. And yet, they are unlikely to find a welcome. I cannot imagine going through a trip like that, only to be turned away at the border of the place you hoped would offer a new, safe start. Yes, my bubble is indeed a privilege.

I'm preaching this Sunday on the troubling exchange between Jesus and the Canaanite woman. Ultimately, this is a story about hearing those who are "other," about inclusion, about reaching across boundaries, about the reach of God's kingdom and salvation. As I write this, it occurs to me that it is also a story about breaking out of the bubbles we inhabit.

We do have times of respite, times where we can catch our breath, retreat a bit, and find renewal. But then we have to come out of those bubbles and engage the world (masked and at a safe physical distance). That is where Jesus calls us to be, and where he leads us--out of our safe sanctuaries and into the world, to break down walls, bridge divides, and work towards the beloved community, where all are welcomed and know the blessings of this life.

## **Everything Happens for a Reason: And Other Lies I've Loved TODAY at 4 pm**

We will listen together to a clip from Rev. Kate Bowler's podcast based on her book.

More Info: "Kate Bowler is a professor at Duke Divinity School with a modest Christian upbringing, but she specializes in the study of the prosperity gospel, a creed that sees fortune as a blessing from God and misfortune as a mark of God's disapproval. At 35, everything in her life seems to point toward "blessing". She is thriving in her job, married to her high school sweetheart, and loves life with her newborn son.

Then she is diagnosed with stage IV colon cancer.

The prospect of her own mortality forces Kate to realize that she has been tacitly subscribing to the prosperity gospel, living with the conviction that she can control the shape of her life with "a surge of determination". Even as this type of Christianity celebrates the American can-do spirit, it implies that if you "can't do" and succumb to illness or misfortune, you are a failure. Kate is very sick, and no amount of positive thinking will shrink her tumors. What does it mean to die, she wonders, in a society that insists everything happens for a reason? Kate is stripped of this certainty only to discover that without it, life is hard but beautiful in a way it never has been before.

Frank and funny, dark and wise, Kate Bowler pulls the reader deeply into her life in an account she populates affectionately with a colorful, often hilarious retinue of friends, megachurch preachers, relatives and doctors. *Everything Happens for a Reason* tells her story, offering up her irreverent hard-won observations on dying and the ways it has taught her to live."
