Adult Education Sunday Morning Series

February 23 through March 29 at 10:10 am

A Discussion of the Presbyterian Church (USA) Churchwide Antiracism Policy, *Facing Racism: A Vision of the Intercultural Community*

During these six weeks, we will discuss the PC (USA) policy on Facing Racism, using the study guide designed to go with it. As the introduction to the policy states, "This is not a time for timidity. The Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) has long held strong convictions regarding the sinfulness of racism and the need to struggle against it. Speaking our own convictions now, with clarity and power, could make a tangible

difference in the current struggle.”

The topics for each week include:

Week 1, February 23: Biblical Imperative to Antiracism

Week 2, March 1: Envisioning a New Way of Life Together

Week 3, March 8: PC(USA) and Racial Reconciliation

Week 4, March 15: Racism 101

Week 5, March 22: Enduring Legacy of Racism in the US

Week 6, March 29: Responding as a Community of Faith

Wednesday Evening Lenten Series

In the Wilderness: On Being Lost, Found and Formed by God

March 4, 11, 18, 25, April 1

6:30 pm in the Parish Hall for a light supper of soup and bread (donations welcome)

7:00 pm Program begins

During the six Wednesdays of Lent, we will gather to reflect on the theme of wilderness. What are the wildernesses God's people have experienced in the past and are living through currently? What happens in the wilderness? How does God form us and lead us in the wilderness? Come join in this journey through Lent as we remember God's promises to lead us through the wilderness, with the sure hope of the promised land ahead of us and the assurance of the resurrection.

March 4 and 11, Rabbi Perry Berkowitz and Rabbi Leah Berkowitz

Journey into the Wilderness: Then, Part I; and Now, Part II

In both sessions we will examine the theme of wilderness through Biblical and post-Biblical sources. What did wilderness mean for ancient Israel, and what is its role in contemporary times—what does it mean for us theologically, spiritually, and ethically in 2020?

March 18 and 25, The Rev. Udo Middelman, *Living East of Eden (Genesis 3:24)*

What does it mean to be living in a natural, social and political wilderness—apart from the wholeness of the Garden of Eden and unable to return to it until God's reign is complete.

April 1, The Rev. Beverly A. Bartlett, *Our Own Personal Wildernesses*

How does God form us and lead us through our own personal wildernesses? As part of the evening's program, there will be an opportunity to use MAPC's labyrinth as a form of walking meditation or prayer, or participate in a guided experience of contemplative prayer.

April 8, A Seder Celebration, beginning at 6 pm

Led by Rabbi Perry Berkowitz and Rabbi Leah Berkowitz

Come join with members of the East Side Synagogue as Rabbis Leah and Perry lead a joyous Seder celebration. The Seder is the annual Passover celebration that recounts the story of the Israelites' release from Egyptian bondage as found in the Book of Exodus. It features liturgy, music, singing, explanation and inspiration. The purpose of the Seder is not only to focus on the past but how the past impacts the present and future. A highlight is not only the eating of ritual symbolic foods but the traditional celebratory feast, a sign of freedom (and plenty delicious!).

The Seder is mostly in English, joyous, and fun. An added treat is to experience during Holy Week the story and foods that Jesus and his disciples, faithful Jews, experienced, and learn how it influenced subsequent Christian practice.

There are two options for the Seder:

1. One is the modified dinner for \$25 which includes the ceremonial wine, ritual foods and appetizers. This portion of the Seder lasts about two hours.
2. The second option, for those who wish to have the full multi-course traditional meal and stay for the whole evening, is to add an additional \$40 for a total of \$65. The entire evening lasts about four hours—and passes very quickly!

(Both options are per person)
